The magazine welcomes the contribution of reports, articles, news, press releases and clippings, letters, contribution to discussions, job offers, internships, internet links etc. To simplify your contribution to the magazine you can send your press releases, headlines, brief information or news in any language. The editorial board will choose topics from your contributions and organize the translation. Reports and detailed articles should follow the editorial guidelines. 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European Social Forum, Paris

The European Social Forum 2003 (ESF) will take place from 12th – 15th November 2003 in Paris as well as the towns of St Denis, Bobigny (Seine-Saint-Denis) and Ivry (Val de Marne). After Florence this ESF is the second social forum to be held on the European continent following on and in the spirit of the World Social Forum of Porto Alegre.

As a place for meeting and discussion for social movements, the ESF is also a space for the elaboration of alternatives and the strategies for their implementation. In order to guarantee its success, the organisation suggests implementing the most unitary framework possible to prepare it so that it will gather all social movements, all kinds of networks, associations and organisations claiming to be part of the process, of the project and of the charter of the World Social Forum. The three days conference brings together people from more than 60 countries in 55 plenary sessions, 300 seminars and hundret of workshops.

There will be a seminar 'Towards a citizens' science in Europe: new forms of co-operation between NGOs, citizens and researchers'. This seminar will be the final event of the EC project INTERACTS, in co-operation with the project ISSNET and the Fondation Science Citoyennes.

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'Science and Society' expressions of interest published on CORDIS

More than 220 expressions of interest (EOI), submitted by European citizens and regarding the science and society section of the Sixth Framework Programme (FP6), have been published on CORDIS, the European Commission's Research and Development Information Service.

The ideas have been submitted by individuals, public and private bodies, as well as research, civil society and media organisations in 29 countries in response to the European Commission's call for expressions of interest in the 'Science and Society' section of FP6.

While the area 'public awareness' attracted the highest level of interest, all themes of science and society have been addressed, including scientific advice, governance, ethics, public awareness, young people, and women and science. The Commission is now revising the science and society work programme for 2004, taking account of the submitted ideas and planning new calls for the funding of projects before the end of the year.

12 expressions of interest are directly related to the networking of science shops through Europe.

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Citizen Participation in Science and Technology (CIPAST)

By the participation of Fondation Science Citoyennes (Paris, France) and the Science Shop for Biology (Utrecht, Netherlands) the international science shop network is involved in a proposal called Citizen Participation in Science and Technology (CIPAST). The overall objective of this proposal is to create and develop a European platform among a diverse spectrum of actors involved and/or interested in participatory initiatives that aim to contribute to the democratic assessing of the social, political and ethical dimensions of scientific and technological developments.

The platform thus aims to contribute to the active participation of society at large in public policy development relating to science and technology.

The platform will serve as a suitable tool and arena for reflecting on current trends and developments in the implementation of participatory processes in European national and transnational contexts, as well as for anticipating and identifying future trends.

The involvement of the science shop network will be mainly related to possibilities of linking civil society needs and positions in the participatory process.

CIPAST has been submitted in the open call for Programme support & networking: FP6-2002-science-society-1 (August 28, 2003).

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Guest scientist wanted

Field: Communication and use of scientific expertise

The "Program Group Humans - Environment - Technology" of the Research Center Juelich (Germany) would like to host an international (non-German) guest scientist who is doing or planning research on public communication of scientific expertise and/or its use in political and individual decision-making.

Candidates could be Ph.D. students, postdocs or of a higher level. Possible scientific disciplines are, for example, sociology, journalism & mass communication, political science, cultural studies, psychology, anthropology and linguistics. In our research we apply a problem-focused interdisciplinary and international perspective.

The Marie Curie program of the European Union, the Alexander von Humboldt-Foundation and the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) offer fellowships of different types and time periods (from a few weeks up to two years) for European and non-European scholars. We



would help to identify an appropriate program and assist in preparing the application. Of course, guest scientists with another funding are also welcome.

Guest scientists could participate in one of our projects or persue an own project that fits into our research focus "The Public, Politics and Mass Media". In this research focus we study science communication and the formation of public opinion on science, technology and the environment under the conditions of the media society. In particular, our research focuses on the impact of scientific knowledge on public meaning construction of global environmental change and technical innovations. Principal research questions are: How is scientific expertise communicated in politics, media and the public? How is it used to inform judgments and how is it integrated in political and private decision-making processes? Empirical methods used in our research so far include content analyses, surveys, in-depth interviews and experimental media reception studies.

German language skills would of course be useful but – dependent on the planned research – English might also suffice.

The Research Center Juelich (http://www.fz-juelich.de/portal/home) is a large (about 4,200 employees) publicly funded research facility. It has many international guest scientists and provides convenient facilities for them (e.g. a Guest House with nice and relatively cheap apartments, laundry, a cultural program, German language courses, a special office for guest scientists etc.). The center is located in the countryside of the very western part of Germany, close to the small town of Juelich. The larger cities of Cologne, Aachen and Duesseldorf, however, can be reached by public transportation in about an hour. Even Brussels, Paris and Amsterdam are only a few hours away by train. The Research Center and the town of Juelich provide a quiet, friendly and safe environment for international guests.
