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Conference Advancing Science and Society Interactions Seville, 3-5 February 2005

More than 150 participants, citizens and scientists from Europe and overseas, will come together in Seville to exchange on community based research, carried out in both community and academic settings. Gerry McCormac, Pro Vice Chancellor Community and Communications, Queen's University Belfast (UK) and Alba González Jácome from the Univesity Iberoamaricana Mexico (MX) – beside others - will give their perspective and experiences in science and society interactions'. Monica Menapace, Project co-ordinator Education and Science, Dir. Science and Society, EC and S. 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Call for Contribution

Conversations on the state of "Science & Society" interactions in Canada *Limited international contributions will be accepted*

The Canadian Science & Society Association - CANSSA, non-profit organization, was launched in November 2004. Through a range of activities, it seeks to support and promote an environment with fluid links between scientific efforts and public concerns and aspirations, where citizens and policy-makers can openly discuss issues of science and technology, so as to make informed choice, and where knowledge is shared within and across all sectors of society and acted on for mutual, long-term benefit. One of its initial efforts is to create a collection of conversations from across Canada, and from interested parties beyond Canada, on the state of "Science & Society" interactions. This collection is to be published independently in late 2005. A limited number of international contributions will also be accepted to provide a broader conceptual perspective.

CANSSA is seeking contributions from academics, policy-makers, citizens, students, members of our native populations, and representatives of the non-profit sector. It will also be contacting each of the federal granting councils, federal and provincial research laboratories, and all Canadian universities, to submit a report on the extent of their activities in promoting science & society interactions.

Contributions can vary between 200-400 words for anecdotal reports to a maximum of 7500 words for a detailed paper of methodological or theoretical issues, or case studies. All citations should be clearly indicated, with use of the APA style strongly encouraged <u>http://www.apastyle.org/elecref.html</u>. Selection of contributions for the bound publication will be performed using a multisector merit review committee. With permission, contributions which, for space limitations cannot be included in the bound edition will be posted on the <u>www.canssa.org</u> web log.

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Magazine II Journal of Community-Based Participatory Research on Health Issues

In the December 2004 issue of the journal Academic Medicine, the Community-Campus Partnerships for Health (CCPH) member Claude Earl Fox and colleagues from the Johns Hopkins Urban Health Institute indicated their plans to launch a new peer reviewed Journal of Community-Based Participatory Research. In the article "*The Johns Hopkins Urban Health Institute: A Collaborative Response to Urban Health Issues*" the authors provide background on the poor health and economic status of the residents of East Baltimore, Maryland. Based on the recommendations of a council on urban health, the Johns Hopkins Urban Health and well-being of the residents of East Baltimore and to promote evidence-based interventions to solve urban health problems nationwide. The article describes the institute's major activities, including community-based participatory research projects, the *Journal of Community-Based Participatory Research*, and programs for research fellows to promote research and learning.

Excerpt: "Most recently, the institute has laid the groundwork for establishing the Journal of Community-Based Participatory Research. Although CBPR is a growing field, it lacks a professional vehicle for communicating research findings among academics, communities, and practitioners. The journal will fill this void, while promoting further collaboration and elevating the visibility and stature of CBPR as a means toward eliminating health disparities and improving health outcomes."

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Consultation Future European Union Research Policy

Results of the online consultation now available

A general consultation for views on the Commission proposal "Science and Technology, the key to Europe's future- Guidelines for future European Union policy to support research", was launched in July 2004 and closed on 15 October 2004. The consultation's results demonstrate strong support for the Commission's proposal which aims at strengthen European support to research. Over 1700 organisations and individuals from across the European Union and beyond expressed their views. 97% of respondents were positive about a stronger support to research at European level. Over 80% thought that the 6 objectives proposed by the Commission in the June 16 Communication are important or very important. The European Commission now has proposed orientations for the development of future European Union programmes to support research activities and policies. They imply a significant expansion of the European Community research budget for the period 2007-2013. Six major objectives are identified:

• Creating European centres of excellence through collaboration between laboratories

• Launching European technological initiatives



- Stimulating the creativity of basic research through competition between teams at European level
- Making Europe more attractive to the best researchers
- Developing research infrastructure of European interest
- Improving the coordination of national research programmes

In addition, two new areas for European-level research activities are presented: space and security. In its plans, the Commission proposes using the most efficient means of implementation, including management through partnership with the Member States and research actors, and "externalised" management. The Commission's ideas for future research policy are a first step. Following the consultation and wider debate, and based on a thorough assessment of evidence and impacts, the Commission will present its legislative proposals for the Seventh Framework Programme for R&D in the course of 2005. It will also showcase current examples in the following areas: "Popularisation of science"; "Public debates and participatory processes" and "Addressing various groups in society".
