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<u>Network I</u> Toolkit for Science Shops

New EU project to support Science Shops

Since the start of the International Science Shop Network Living Knowledge in 2003 many new initiatives bloomed to start new science shops in Europe. On May 1, 2005 a new EU funded project 'Training and Mentoring of Science Shops' (TRAMS) has been launched. TRAMS will offer a toolkit with training materials for new and existing science shop. Besides TRAMS will offer new science shops an individual mentoring programme for practical advise and support. The work packages of TRAMS will focus on 1) A mentoring programme for Science Shops, 2) Training materials and programmes 3) E-modules and E-learning tools, 4) Dissemination of training and mentoring activities.

In TRAMS 18 organisations from 14 countries (Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Estonia, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Latvia, Netherlands, Romania, United Kingdom, Spain and Turkey) cooperate. A combination of experienced and new science shops will be a guarantee for customised tools and a relevant content of the toolbox. TRAMS will run pilot projects to with the intention to offer structural services for the international Science Shop network. The Living Knowledge magazine and website will be used for the dissemination of the information on TRAMS and the tools that will be developed. Activities, like workshops, that will be open for all members of Living Knowledge will be announced on the Living Knowledge news list and newsletter. TRAMS has been rewarded with € 450,000 for a period of three years.

Citizen Participation in Science and Technology

In the last decades, the involvement of civil society and citizens in policy deliberation and decision-making processes relating to scientific and technical issues has undergone significant and also highly heterogeneous changes in European countries. The CIPAST project (Citizen Participation in Science and Technology), which started on April, 1st, aims at bringing together organisations that have significant experiences in the field of participatory procedures in scientific and technological issues, such as parliamentary offices, research institutes, science shops and science museums, academic researchers. The identified organisations will be mobilized for setting up a training programme tailored to the various contexts in which participation of civil society is relevant. The increasing international network of Science Shops and their demand-driven and bottom-up approach to facilitate and develop citizens' access to, and use of scientific information, knowledge and expertise was identified for possible future cooperation. Several workshops and a final conference, as well as a website, discussion lists and a newsletter will help to disseminate best practises and will help to structure an expanded network of European organisations involved in participatory processes.

Science and Society Meetings and Round Tables

Science Shops are actually involved in different meetings with the Science and Society directorate. On June 9 there will be a meeting about ways to engage NGOs in research activities. This meeting is part of the progressive development of the DG Research relations with civil society organisations. It is a followup of a specific session on NGO involvement which took place at the EU Forum "Science in Society" on 9-11 March 2005 on "Civil Society and Science: An increased role for NGOs?" The purpose of the current meeting is to discuss possible modalities to involve civil society organizations in research activities with some NGOs which expressed their interest in EU research and DG research services.

On June 9 there will be also a meeting with representatives of the Regional Authorities of the members states in Brussels. The scope of this meeting will be 'Science Shops as actors for regional development'.



The aim of this meeting is to inform the representatives about science shop activities and the possibilities that Science shops offer the civil society organisations. Also options for Regional Authorities in supporting Science Shops will be discussed.

On June 10 a workshop on Science Shops with representatives of experienced and new science shops as well as some NGOs and policy makers will be organised in Brussels. The aim of this meeting is to discuss concrete options to bring an international dimension into local co-operations between science shops and local NGOs The debate will also focus on the recently started project called TRAMS (Training and Mentoring Science Shops) and the possibilities for other participants to take part in it. Additionally this workshop will discuss the structure of the future International Science Shop Network and its international contact office.

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Research & Development Campaign for a FP7 more engaged with sustainability and social justice

All communications and reports coming from the EC and the European Parliament and concerning FP 7, the research & development programme of the European Commission, signalise that there will be very few money for science and society issues as well as issues directly related to sustainable development. That's why the 'European Science Social Forum (ESSF)' – a platform of non-profit associations and NGOs as well as individual persons that work to get a model of scientific and technological progress engaged with a solidary, sustainable and fair society – proposes a Europe wide petition that critically analyses future research priorities and the vision of society they portray. The ESSF proposes a kind of alternative programme and vision.

The petition, signed by more than 350 civil society organisations, scientists, and citizens from 19 European countries (and 12 other countries), shows that there is both scientific and civil society unease about the way that FP7 is being organised and about the priorities it is proposing. The current FP7 process is mainly influenced by technical and business experts who fashion the world for a narrow range of interests and there is not enough influence from the wider European public. The petition continues to gather signatures.

- Boundaries of public and private information and authentication of data, information and knowledge.
