# **Knowledge Dissemination & Community-based Research in Canada**

The CUexpo 2005 conference in Winnipeg (September 15-18, 2005) brought together Canadian academic and community-based researchers and policy-makers from offered a wide range of perspective contributions about community-based research in Canada. Although this is a federal government funded initiative, CURA conferences attract much more CBR activities taking place in Canada. The CURA project in many ways is strengthening community-based research in Canada. CURA is a solid example of a national government involvement that the EC could perhaps pursue in its support for the community-based research. With the CURA programme, Canada seems to be on the right track to help community-based organizations and researchers link with one another. CUexpo is a biannual event. At this year's CUexpo, Khan Rahi and Caspar De Bok jointly organized a workshop, entitled "The Role of Community-based Research and Science Shops Networks in Disseminating Knowledge for Civic Action: Lessons learned from the North American and European practices". At CUexpo 2005 significant contacts have been made to link up Canadian colleagues with the Living Knowledge network to support one another in ongoing challenges in disseminating knowledge and promoting CBR for positive change. The next conference will be held in Victoria, BC in 2007. It seems reasonable to consider scheduling the next Living Knowledge conference and CUexpo so that those interested could benefit from attending each one on alternate years. Now both are scheduled for 2007.

First CIPAST newsletter available

The regulation of scientific-technological innovation becomes more and more hazardous for decision makers. New governance strategies are based on a principle of partnership between the state, experts, stake-holder interests and citizens. Partnership brings more different values and knowledge to solve problems. The CIPAST platform – which stands for Citizen Participation in Science and Technology – aims at structuring a network, disseminating good practices and circulating relevant information. The CIPAST work programme will foster the transfer of expertise through the implementation of training programmes for the three identified contexts of decision: "upstream", "regulation" and "social diffusion". A corpus of training tools, based on casestudies and tested in training sessions, will be developed for the pragmatic needs of the potential users. The first CIPAST newsletter was recently published.

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#### **Call for Scientific Programme Proposals**

The European Science Foundation (ESF) is pleased to announce a Call for Proposals for new Scientific Programmes. An ESF Scientific Programme is a networking activity bringing together nationally funded research activities for four to five years, to address a major scientific issue or a science-driven topic of research infrastructure, at the European level. #### **Workshop on Science Shops**

The next Science Shop workshop is planned to take place on 25 October 2005 with an agenda on "How Science Shops contribute to the development of universities". It is intended to invite colleagues from DG Education and Culture in order to discuss, in particular, the benefit science shops can provide to universities and to students.

#### **Thematic Research Cooperation**

In late fall a thematic research cooperation might become an important activity and added value of the Living Knowledge network. The EC intends to announce a call for proposals to start international cooperation on small scale community based research projects. The local dimension of the research and the international cooperation with organisations dealing with the same kind of local research questions seem to be the key elements of this call for proposals. If you run regular research projects which might be of interest for local organisations (and Science Shops) in other countries you can consider submitting a project proposal once the call has been announced. This call will be a pilot call in FP6 and might become a structural call in FP 7 if it will be successful.

#### Regulatory animal testing

A survey of the factors influencing the use of animal testing to meet regulatory requirements.

A study by Marie-Jeanne Schiffelers, Gerrit Hagelstein, Annemiek Harreman, Martijn van der Spek, and published by the Science Shop for Biology, Utrecht, surveys and describes the factors and actors that influence the use of animal testing to comply with regulatory requirements. Wherever possible, the research focused on animal testing required by protocol for the authorization and release of pharmaceuticals. The research findings are based primarily on interviews with representatives of the main stakeholder groups (legislators, regulators, industry, science and NGOs). In other words, this study provides a survey of perceived influences. These findings are meant to help identify possible follow-up projects at the European level in order to reduce regulatory animal testing wherever possible.
