Gateways

International Journal of Community Research and Engagement Gateways is an academic electronic journal concerned with the practice and processes of community engagement. It provides a forum for academics, practitioners and community representatives to pursue issues and reflect on prac-tices related to interactions between tertiary institutions and community organisations; academic interventions in community; community-based projects with links to the tertiary sector and community initiatives. The journal pub-lishes evaluative case studies of community engagement initiatives, analyses of the policy environment and theoreti-cal reflections that contribute to the scholarship of engagement.

The journal addresses community engagement occurring across scholarly disciplines and at all levels of community, including: engaging diverse communities in capacity building initiatives, including young people, older people, peo-ple with a disability, Indigenous communities, and culturally diverse and interfaith communities; health promotion and capacity building; community cultural development (CCD); rural regeneration; housing and neighbourhood re-newal; information technology (IT) and public participation; collaborative design and community safety; the envi-ronment and natural resource management; corporate social responsibility; social enterprise and social entrepreneur-ship; triple bottom line accounting (measuring economic, environmental and social outcomes). The journal also aims to engage academics and policymakers more fully with the concerns of the community and community engagement. It also seeks to articulate creative tensions between theory and practice.

Community engagement requires institutional change in the ways in which community, universities and government see themselves and their partnerships. There is also a need to promote the value of research that is needs driven rather than curiosity driven. Gateways will explore these vital concerns for the enhancement of Community Engage-ment in its many forms.

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New Name and Organizational Structure for Science Shop for Biology Utrecht

Starting January 2008, some changes took place in Utrecht with the Science Shops. The Dutch names changes from Wetenschapswinkel to Kennispunt. The other important change is the merging of the Science Shops for chemistry, physics and biology in to one Science Shop. The English name remains to be 'Science Shop', and more specific 'Science Shop, Faculty of Science'. The 'Kennispunt' now has two staff members, Ariëtte Dommering and Victor Winter. Also the Science Shops for Law, for Social Sciences and for Arts have been transfered into Kennispunt for the Faculty of Law, Economics and Governance, the Faculty of Social and Behavioural Sciences and the Faculty of Humanities. The scope of the Utrecht Science Shops now is on SME's as well.

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EC Calls

Area 5.1.1.5: Public understanding of science and promotion of public debate SiS-2008-1.1.5.1 Exchanges and co-operation of local actors on scientific culture This activity aims to exchange best practices and cooperation between cities (and/or regions) for the development of a scien-tific culture at the local level. Action in 2008 will focus on the creation of a European mission-oriented network of cities (preferably of different sizes) spe-

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cifically constituted to cooperate on science in society issues. The network should ensure the performance of concrete actions such as: exchanges of best practices (twinning, coaching, networking); actions that can foster the co-operation of local actors on scientific culture in an attractive way; also using their scientific technical and cultural heri-tage; developing two-way communication between scientists and citizens. Evaluation will treat positively those proposals which propose actions liaise with existing Science Shops, science museums / centres or encourage the development of new Science Shops (or similar organisations) as a tool to provide local civil society organisations with the scientific knowledge they need. Existing network organisations should propose new partnerships with other structures and actors.

Expected impact: Actions for the development of a scientific culture at the local level should in particular bring together rele-vant local actors involved in science, culture, entertainment, education, local economical development, citizens' participation, media (e.g. local authorities, outreach departments in universities and research centres, science museums, science cafes, schools, libraries, Science Shops, citizens' conferences, local civil society organisations, local media, enterprises etc.). The European financing will not, however, support individual cities developing their local actions.

Other activities/areas open for proposals in the current call are 'Ethics and Science', 'Strengthening the role of women in scientific research and scientific decision-making', 'Encouraging cooperation and networking between scien-tific events organisers on public engagement with science'.

Deadline for all proposals is Tuesday 18 March 2008 at 17.00.00, Brussels local time.

Global Alliance in Community-Based Research

The question how to create new partnerships, teaching and learning opportunities, and project development and how to effectively organize multicultural and interdisciplinary collaboration connecting local community issues with the global perspective has been a main topic discussed during numerous national and international gatherings. Recently a consulta-tion about the best ways to move forward with a Global Alliance in Community-Based Research was held on Septem-ber 2 in Paris, after the 3rd Living Knowledge conference. There is strong support for linking up the various networks. It was decided for the time being to make use of the web-site and newsletter capacities of the LK network itself to stimulate debate, circulate ideas and move forward. Peter Levesque (Canada) and Rajesh Tandon (India) were asked to prepare an initial statement of principles for discussion. CUexpo 2008 will therefore also provide opportunities for networking across Canada and world-wide.

Democracy 2007

The Rhône-Alpes Regional Council organized the World Meeting on the theme "Participatory democracy from the local to the global level: for what sort of development ?" on 10-12 December 2007 in Lyon, France. This initiative put in light the extreme wealth of the participative democracy experiences from all over the world. Over 800 ideas or propos-als came out of only one day's workshops and, with those from the forums and agoras on the second day, constitute the building blocks produced by the meeting.
