Successful, inspiring & engaging - 7th LK Conference 2016

From 22 - 24 June 2016 the 7th Living Knowledge Conference was successfully hosted by Dublin Institute of Technology in the lively city of Dublin. The conference - as part of the EnRRICH project - helped to build policy, practice and partnerships to create a better awareness of the value of RRI in the curriculum, and to build the capacity of students across Europe to engage in collaborative, ethical open research with communities.



The friendliness, cooperation and the shared thirst for knowledge of all the guests truly enhanced the atmosphere of this event and made it a thoroughly enjoyable three day conference. Many guests had travelled from far and near to attend the conference. 266 people had registered to attend the conference from 28 countries and from 5 different continents. It was a multinational event which made it all the more exciting to meet and network with people from all over the world.

The EnRRICH tool for educators: (Re-)Designing curricula in higher education from a "Responsible Research and Innovation" perspective

The manual introduces educators to RRI and presents the EnRRICH tool. The EnRRICH tool aspires to guide educators to (re-)design curricula in higher education from a RRI perspective. This preliminary tool will be applied and tested in the next months and may be further refined. It provides insights about what RRI in higher education entails, about principles to take into account when (re-)designing curricula, about specific RRI competencies to be acquired by higher education students, about concrete steps for setting RRI-driven learning outcomes and for choosing consistent assessment, teaching and learning methods, with a focus on higher education modules.

<u>Summary Report on Policy for Rewarding Responsible Research and Innovation through academic curricula in</u> <u>Higher Education</u>

This report summarises the results of a policy scoping exercise to examine how and where Responsible Research and Innovation connects with the interests of people involved in policy development for teaching and learning in higher education. It concludes that there are synergies which to date have not been fully examined, and seeks the views on how to further articulate these connections.

New Science Shop established at Vilnius College of Technologies and Design

Throughout 2015 and 2016 Vilnius College of Technologies and Design has worked towards establishing a Science Shop, which as newcomer is part of the EnRRICH project. During spring semester first pilot projects were carried out to experiment with the concept and facilitate the communication between the College and CSOs. Pilot projects were carried out on the topic of Sustainable Community development with the focus on Inclusive & Active Design and developing optimal technical solutions for civil society actors – stakeholders like local communities, schools and a museum.



In spring semester of the academic year 2015/2016 4 transdisciplinary projects were implemented, 75 students were involved. Besides their direct purpose and benefit for local community, the Pilot Science Shop projects aimed to

answer organizational questions and to help finding the most suitable organizational solution for VTDK Science Shop. A team of 11 lecturers regularly held meetings in order to share upcoming problems and best practices, and find the best operation model. During the semester closing discussion several challenges for future were brought out. Lecturers agreed that it would be very important to increase motivation and responsibility of students which are involved in research, to develop a strong and stable link between the academia and the CSOs and find the way to embed interdisciplinary projects into curriculum.

A scientific challenge on "evolutionary housing" in Lyon

In June 2016, the University of Lyon tried out an inventive format aimed to mix participatory research with RRI principles for the EnRRICH work package 3 dedicated to "Trialling Good Practices". The idea started from one of the "good practices" identified through previous interviews with lecturers: a "scientific challenge" which has been taking place for several years in the INSA (one of Université de Lyon's Engineering schools) at the end of each academic year. But instead of giving students an issue proposed by one of the major companies which are partners of the school, the Science and Society department asked a local CSO "Habitat et Humanisme" to submit a concrete problem they faced. The CSO has presented a major need they face in the field of social housing: how to create qualitative spaces within small surfaces, taking into account the evolution of its occupants and their different needs around the clock.

The ten multidisciplinary and multicultural teams of students were monitored, analysed and valued by a researcher in educational science. He conducted an observation focused on the RRI aspects. Supported by two collaborators from a CSO they studied the impact of the two-hour RRI training implemented at the beginning of the challenge. A valuable learning obtained through this "real time observation" was that the students put a strong emphasis on RRI (engagement with civil society and gender) during their oral presentations, but as a communication and marketing argumentation.

First big RRI event in Flanders - 6 September 2016, Brussels

Five years after its introduction by the European Commission in 2011, the Department of Science & Innovation of the Flemish government and the Royal Flemish Science Academy hosted a first event on Responsible Research & Innovation. The Flemish EnRRICH partners of Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB) have been involved in the planning of this event from the very start and hosted an EnRRICH 'break-out' session in the afternoon. Furthermore two other European RRI projects, RRI Tools and FoTTRIS, presented their project work and introduced the really practical and useful RRI Tools website. Contrary to the expectations, around 180 people from research, higher education, policy and civil society registered for this RRI day. Taken into account the novelty of the RRI concept in Flanders, this can be considered as a big success! Let's hope this sparks a big Flemish RRI movement!

CIMULACT - Online consultation "Research for Society" until 19 October 2016

<u>CIMULACT</u> stands for 'Citizen and Multi-Actor Consultation on Horizon 2020'. The three-year project funded by the European Commission engages more than 1000 citizens in 30 countries in Europe, along with a variety of other actors, in shaping a desirable sustainable future. In a highly participatory process, the project will provide a unique contribution to European research and innovation policies and topics, create dialogue and shared understanding among the actors, and build strong capacities in citizen engagement, thereby enhancing responsible research and innovation (RRI) in the EU. Currently, an online consultation is running in 30 European countries asking citizens and other actors which direction research should go. The online consultation Research for Society is based on real societal needs identified during the previous CIMULACT consultations. PhD course "Philosophy of Responsible Innovation" - Subscribe until 1 November 2016

This course discusses the main philosophical issues in relation to Responsible Innovation, an emerging concept in the EU context which highlights the relevance of social-ethical issues in research and innovation practices. This emerging concept calls for philosophical reflection on the nature, scope and applicability of responsibility and innovation in innovation practices in general, and the way social-ethical issues can be applied and addressed in specific fields like business, healthcare and energy in particular. Topics that will be covered include the nature of responsibility in responsible innovation, the role of societal values in innovation and value sensitive design, philosophical reflections on the role of knowledge and risk in innovation, constructive technology assessment and governance of responsible innovation, Responsible Innovation in the public sector (healthcare) and responsible innovation in the private sector. SecurePART project successfully finished - Outcomes available online

The FP7 SecurePART project finished successfully end of April 2016. The main goal of the two-year project was to contribute to increase the engagement and involvement of civil society organisations (CSOs) in EU-funded security research in order to (i) take more into consideration potential social issues and non-technological innovation; and (ii) address the problem of acceptance of security research outputs by wider society. Navigating towards shared responsibility in research and innovation - Outcomes of the Res-AGorA project



The <u>Res-AGorA Project</u> has developed a framework of principles intended to harness the selfgoverning capacities and capabilities of research and innovation actors within Europe. This orienting framework will help actors to understand their responsibility challenges and to design, negotiate and implement their own context specific understanding of responsibility in research and innovation. Sparks Project - Tour of DIY Science Exhibition successfully started

In July 2016, the Sparks exhibition Beyond the Lab: the DIY science revolution has successfully started its tour through Europe. <u>Beyond the Lab</u> tells the stories of a growing number of 'DIY scientists' around the world who are busily hacking, experimenting and inventing in the field of healthcare and focuses on three areas of DIY science: Citizen Science, Health Hacking and DIY Biology. The first four partners showing the exhibition during July and August 2016 were Science Museum London (UK), Copernicus Science Center (Poland), Ustanova Hiša eksperimentov (Slovenia) and Bonn Science Shop (Germany). To engage people in science and RRI, innovative participatory activities accompany the exhibition and new event formats have been developed. One format is the Science Espresso - shorter than a café but snappy! The idea behind the Sparks Science Espressos is to create an opportunity for the public to meet experts and researchers outside their professional context and talk with them in an informal manner.

Introducing "The Future Space for Sustainability and Science" in Karlsruhe, Germany

Since 2015 the new Science Shop "Future Space" aims at connecting scientists with citizens, the city administration and local stakeholders in Karlsruhe, Germany. It is embedded in the sustainable research and development 'Reallabor' "District Future – Urban Lab". It serves as a transdisciplinary office for scientists working in the urban transition lab in the middle of the project area, is meeting point for numerous groups in the field of sustainability and venue for all kind of activities (workshops, sharing parties, talks, student seminars and more). The Future Space was opened in 2015 in the course of the transdisciplinary research project "Urban Transition Lab 131". Both transdisciplinary urban transition labs are based at the Institute for Technology Assessment and System Analysis (KIT) in Karlsruhe and are dealing with the sustainable development of urban life using the example of a local city quarter in Karlsruhe. Based on two major civil consultation events in 2014 and 2015 and numerous smaller ones (workshops, round tables, exhibitions etc.) the locals expressed their visions for a more sustainable future life in their quarter and pointed out needs for action. These problems and needs formed the basis for inter- and transdisciplinary research actions (e.g. in the fields of mobility, community, energy...). The work on these topics and projects often does involve student work and teaching.

Success factors for Science-Society cooperation

Zusammenarbeit von Wissenschaft und Zivilgesellschaft - Bestandsaufnahme und Bedarfsanalyse

Study by Foundation Mercator, Switzerland, 2016

A study commissioned by the Foundation Mercator Switzerland shows that there is a willingness and a need for cooperation between science and civil society organizations. But to make joint projects successful, several requirements must be met. The survey of 100 scientists and 150 representatives of civil society shows that mutual interest, timing of involvement and realistic expectations and clear roles are crucial requirements for a successful cooperation. The Foundation Mercator Switzerland - based on the findings and recommendations of the study - will bring together the participating scientists and CSOs to a networking event, so that they can discuss how and on what subjects they can work together. In addition, the Foundation will introduce continuously existing information and exchange offers and develop other promotional and information formats as needed.
